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Welcome to the Audubon Society of Rhode Island's (ASRI) annual Osprey Monitoring Report for the state of Rhode Island (and part of Massachusetts).

The Osprey Monitoring Program was initiated in 1977 by the Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management (RIDEM). The goal was to monitor the state Osprey population as it recovered from the effects of the pesticide DDT used in the 1940s through the 60s in Rhode Island.

Although DDT had been banned in 1972 the chemical continued to have a negative effect on the raptor population. In 1976 Osprey were designated as an endangered species. The first statewide count by RIDEM in 1977 yielded only 12 active nests. In the 1940s (before DDT) it was estimated that there were over a thousand nests between Boston and New York. DDT took a major toll on the population of this fish-eating bird. The poison worked its way through the food chain, bio-accumulating in Osprey. The result was very weak eggshells which easily broke when incubated.

Since 1977 the Osprey Monitoring Program has been made possible by efforts of biologists, donors and volunteers who have observed all known Osprey nests in Rhode Island and parts of Massachusetts, and carefully recorded data on the number of checks fledged and status of each nest.

In 2010 RIDEM passed management of the project to the Audubon Society of Rhode Island. Today, over 70 volunteer monitors continue to observe the state's Osprey population. By watching these sentinels, we learn more about wildlife and natural habitats as well as the level of human impact on these special places and unique species. It is a great testament to the dedication of Audubon's volunteer monitors that this citizen-science program continues to thrive.

Summary of 2021 Monitoring Results

Rhode Island

Throughout the 2021 Osprey breeding season 75 Osprey monitors from Audubon Society of Rhode Island volunteered 934 hours while monitoring 222 nests across 22 communities in Rhode Island.

Of the 222 nests that were monitored, 24 sites had no nests, 36 were classified as inactive (no breeding activity), and 7 were classified as housekeeping (breeding attempted but not sustained). Of the 154 nests showing breeding activity, 123 were successful, producing a total of 226 fledglings.

Glossary of Monitoring Terms

Inactive: Osprey may have been present at the nest, but no breeding-related behavior was observed.

Housekeeping: Osprey pair was observed at the nest but breeding behavior was not sustained through the season.

Active: Mating, incubation or other breeding behavior was observed.

Successful: Fledgling (s) were observed. This category is a subset of Active nests. **Fledgling**: Young bird with flight feathers (as opposed to a chick) was observed.



The following graph compares the number of active nests (showing breeding activity), successful nests (fledgling observed) and the number of fledglings observed over the life of the monitoring program. Given the volume of data, only the odd years of the program have been displayed in the graph. There is no data available for 2009, which was the year before Audubon Society of Rhode Island began managing the program.




Osprey Breeding Status

In 2021 monitors observed 226 fledglings in Rhode Island. This number is dependent on several factors, including the levels of available food (fish) and nesting locations. Other factors include the number of monitors, their access to the nests, and their time spent observing the nests. This year both the number of monitors and hours spent monitoring were down slightly over recent years. That said, the number of fledglings observed (226) remains consistent with the average of 220.5 fledglings per year since Audubon began managing the program.



Graph 3: Total number of Osprey fledglings observed by year.

Tracking the number of Osprey that fledge from year to year is important when determining the health of an Osprey population. Studies have estimated that the breeding rate needed to balance adult mortality in New England is between 0.8 and 1.0 fledged young per active nest. In 2021 there were 1.7 fledglings per active nest and 1.8 per successful nest. These results indicate that the Osprey population in Rhode Island is not only self-supporting, but growing.




Graph 4: Average fledglings per Active and Successful nests.

Graph 5: Osprey Nesting Activity Across Rhode Island 2016-2021





Osprey Nesting Activity in Seekonk & Swansea, Massachusetts


Although the primary mission of program is to survey nests in Rhode Island, for many years volunteer monitors have observed and reported on nests located in Swansea and Seekonk, Massachusetts. Starting in 2016, results for Rhode Island and Massachusetts have been recorded separately. A total of 8 nests were monitored in 2021. Of these 8 nests, 1 site had no nest, 7 nests were active. Of the 7 active nests, 5 were successful.

Graph 7: Overall status of monitored nests in Massachusetts in 2021.


The Rhode Island Osprey Monitoring Program

Throughout the 2021 breeding season (April-August), 75 volunteers reported on 230 nests. (222 in Rhode Island and 8 nests in Massachusetts.) Monitors submitted over 2,536 observations and spent a total of 934 hours in the field, averaging 4 hours of monitoring per nest and 12 hours per monitor. The Audubon Society of Rhode Island thanks these dedicated volunteers for their continued support of the Rhode Island Osprey Monitoring program.
